Lesson Objectives:

- 1. Understand the use of *which* and *who*.
- 2. Use the *Hong Kong Corpus of Addresses by Governors and Chief Executives* as a tool for inductive learning.
- 3. Practise writing skills.

Length: approx. 30 mins

Target students: Advanced Secondary School Learners; Learners of English for Academic Purposes

Activity 1

- 1. Go to http://rcpce.engl.polyu.edu.hk/index.html
- 2. Click on <u>KWIC</u> for the *HK Corpus of Addresses by Governors and Chief Executives*
- 3. Go to the search box and enter the word *which*
- 4. Look at the first 20 results: what precedes *which* in each sentence? What pattern(s) do you notice?
- 5. Discuss in pairs.
- 6. Repeat the same process by searching *who*.

Activity 2

The following statements have been retrieved and adapted from the above corpus. Spot the errors with the use of **who** and **which**.
